| <b>3</b> | Definition/Explanation is ordinary and lacking in depth research | Picture is present, but it is a basic picture of the topic            | Significance to U.S. history is addressed, but needs more explanation and facts to hook connection |
| <b>1</b> | Definition/Explanation of topic is weak and short                | Picture has no connection to topic                                    | Significance to U.S. History is weak, and does not relate to topic                                 |
